The Family Resource Center Has Been Strengthening Families in Josephine County For Fifteen Years

Fourteen Non-Profits In One Location Means \$60 - \$80,000 Goes To Services Instead of Rent

What is a Family Resource Center?

The main purpose of family resource centers is to involve and support parents. They also help improve children's development by providing referrals, activities and services to families.

Research shows that family resource centers increase family involvement and enhance a child's educational experience.*

The Family Resource Center at Coalition for Kids is the oldest in Oregon. For fifteen years the FRC has offered a common meeting place for young families of varied backgrounds and interests. These families wish to provide their children with educational and social experiences. "The fact that this building exists as a residence for activities geared towards young children and families is a source of pride for the people of Grants Pass," says Marty Jacobson, an Early Intervention Specialist at Early Childhood Services.

Coalition for Kids and its thirteen partner agencies help

families succeed by offering many programs and services. The Family Resource Center helps over 7,500 families each year to become more self-sufficient and productive citizens. Eighty percent of those helped are low-income families.



There are 14 non-profit agencies located in the Family Resource Center. This co-location provides many low-income families with "one-stop shopping" for services, offering one way to overcome transportation barriers.

The Family Resource Center also offers services in a non-stigmatizing environment. Children and families can participate with multiple agencies in a familiar setting, developing safe and supportive relationships with other parents and staff.

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Increased Access to Services

Parents seeking an education can drop their child off at the Family Resource Center and visit the RCC TRiO office or the Literacy Council in the Hamilton House Annex. A child in a morning Head Start class can go down the hall for wrap-around child care in the afternoon so his parents don't have to leave work or school in the middle of the day to pick him up.

Love & Logic Classes Start Up Again In January

The next Love & Logic parenting class will start on January 9, 2007. Classes meet for six consecutive Tuesdays from 6:30 to 8:30 pm at Coalition for Kids. Cost is \$50 per couple.
